# Journal of Physics G announces new Editor-in-Chief

Professor A B Balantekin of the University of Wisconsin, Madison has been appointed as the new Editor-in-Chief of Journal of Physics G: Nuclear and Particle Physics. Professor Balantekin brings to the journal an outstanding reputation for work at the interface of nuclear, particle and astrophysics, particularly in neutrino physics. In this role Professor Balantekin succeeds outgoing Editor Professor Lee Schroeder of Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory. We are confident that Professor Balantekin will continue to build upon the excellent work done by Professor Schroeder in his term as Editor.

2005 also marks an exciting juncture in the history of *Journal of Physics G* as it reaches its 30th year of publication. The journal has redrafted its scope in order to strengthen its support for physicists working in areas of intersection between nuclear and particle physics and with the help of the new Editor-in-Chief, the journal hopes to continue to expand its coverage in this important growth area.


# IOP attendance at Online Information 2004, London proves to be a big success

## **Big news for New Journal of Physics**

In a key development for *New Journal of Physics* (NJP) and its open-access publishing model, the Joint Information Systems Committee (JISC) in the UK has announced an extension to its current funding agreement with the journal to December 31, 2005. This means that all staff members of eligible higher and further education institutions in the UK can publish work that they submit to NJP before the end of 2005 without charge.

In the last 12 months NJP has seen the number of worldwide article submissions rise by more than 50% and its readership extend to over 150 countries. There have been more than 400,000 downloads of NJP articles and last year saw a significant jump in the journal's Impact Factor to 2.48.

A particularly high profile recent paper in the journal from groups at Cornell and Columbia in the USA reported, with the aid of movie footage, a wax-analogue observation of sea-floor spreading. ## **IOP features in a December issue of Time Magazine**

As part of Time Magazine's series 'The Year in Medicine 2004: From A to Z', a study into the 'physics of wearing high heels', commissioned and published by the Institute in 2004, was mentioned under 'S' for Shoes.

The study, carried out for the Institute by Dr Paul Stevenson of the University of Surrey, aimed to devise a formula that high-heel fans can use to work out just how high they can go. Based on your shoe size, the formula tells you the maximum height of heel you can wear without toppling over or suffering agonies.

The formula includes variables such as the

number of years' experience you have in wearing high heels, the cost of the shoes and units of alcohol consumed.

Laura Grant, a physicist from Liverpool University, welcomes the Institute's new formula, commenting, 'many of my physicist colleagues have no trouble understanding quantum mechanics but can't figure out how women can wear high heels. Now I can explain to them how I minimise the probability of tripping up'.

## IOP Journal Archive free to UK universities

On January 24, 2005, IOP and the Joint Information Systems Committee (JISC) announced a special agreement that will make the contents of the IOP Journal Archive between 1874 and 1998 permanently accessible to all higher and further education institutions in the UK.

The positive response to the announcement from the UK has exceeded our expectations. We've also received questions from customers in other parts of the world about how they can arrange access to the archive for their researchers and students. Please read on for additional information...

#### What does the IOP Journal Archive include?

The historic archive comprises over 110,000 articles which amount to over 1.5 million pages of physics research, including papers by Sir John Fleming, Sir Ernest Rutherford, Niels Bohr, Lord Rayleigh and Sir Edward Appleton. More recent Nobel Laureates whose work appears in the archive include Harry Kroto, Herbert Kroemer, Anthony J Leggett and Vitaly Ginzburg.

In 2005, the historic archive includes all IOP journal content from 1874 to 1994, inclusive. (The JISC agreement is 'non-standard' as it includes material published up to 1998.)

Access to articles published after 1994 is available through institutional journal subscriptions, which include online access to the current volume plus a 10-year full-text archive (1995 – 2005 where applicable).

## Which institutions are eligible to sign up for the archive under the JISC agreement?

All state-funded higher and further education institutions in the UK are eligible.

#### How can eligible institutions set up free access?

Full details on how to obtain access to the archive can be found by visiting the JISC website at **www.jisc.ac.uk/coll\_ioparchive.html** A licence agreement must be completed and returned to us.

In addition, institutions that are not already registered to receive electronic access to IOP journals will need to register for this service. Electronic journal registration is simple and a registration form can be downloaded from

www.jisc.ac.uk/coll\_ioparchive.html

## How can other institutions set up access to the archive?

The historic archive is available by annual subscription or to purchase for a one-time fee. Institutions who purchase the archive can buy an annual update to the archive each year. Access to the archive can also be arranged through regional consortia.



Journal of Statistical Mechanics: Theory and Experiment (JSTAT) will celebrate its first birthday in March. The journal, created jointly with the International School for Advanced Studies (SISSA), is an electronic-only, peerreviewed journal bringing together cutting-edge research in all aspects of statistical physics.

JSTAT opened for submissions on January 19, 2004 and reached its submission target for the year in July. To date we have accepted over 100 papers and we are pleased to announce that the journal has been accepted for coverage in the Thomson ISI databases beginning with Volume 1 March 2004.

JSTAT was free to access during 2004 but is now only available by subscription. It is included in a number of IOP's money-saving packages.

## **LINKING TO AND FROM IOP JOURNALS**

A key feature of any online data service should be open linking between information resources. With the onset of many different ways to link to and from content, it can be a confusing subject area for many.

We have made it easy for you to set up links directly to IOP journals from your Web site, database or OPAC. IOP journal abstracts are freely available to all, so anyone can access the bibliographic citation and abstract of any article available in our Electronic Journals service. You can link to any level of the IOP Electronic Journals service - to a journal, volume, issue or even to a specific article.

We also offer a wide range of links from references cited in IOP articles to original full text articles, preprints, abstracts and document delivery services. IOP is a key member of the CrossRef publishers' initiative that promotes cross-publisher linking at the article level.

Some of the services/initiatives we offer or are involved in are:

- **STACKS** Our STACKS link management system and hyperlink protocol allows librarians. publishers, database services and online gateways to integrate links to IOP journals into their services.
- Open Archives Initiative (OAI) This is a standard through which content providers make metadata available for harvesting in a common format (Dublin Core). Our Electronic Journals service is compliant with the OAI technical framework.
- Reference Linking We have established links to a wide variety of services. This means that subscribers to our Electronic Journals may view an abstract or preprint of an article cited in the reference list of one of our online articles, or access the full text of the original article at the publisher's Web site (subject to subscription status).
- Forward Citing The IOP Electronic Journals service provides subscribers with links to citing articles. This enables them to understand the impact articles have had on future research.
